As you know, we are now working on our new phonic system, Unlocking Letters and Sounds. This takes us through remembering sounds, reading tricky words, blending, segmenting and writing every day. It also includes an element of echo reading so I read something, then the children read the same sentence. I have been very impressed with the progress with reading this week.
